### 1.0 Approval of Minutes

# 1.1 Approval, Policy & Advocacy Meeting Minutes, January 9, 2015

<u>Action:</u> Upon a motion by Dr. Katherine Johnson and a second by Dr. Jim Murdaugh the minutes of the January 9, 2015 meeting of Policy & Advocacy Committee were approved without objection.

#### 2.0 2015 Substantive Issues

Dr. Jim Henningsen reported there is a draft bill on textbook affordability and the presidents have been asked for their feedback from the Governor's office. Mr. Bill Mullowney reported that agreeing on the design principles would be most beneficial. The five drafted design principles are as follows:

- Ensure consistency between similar statutes
- Make is simple for students and their families to use the sales tax exemption
- Recognize current practice of instructional materials
- Move from current timeline for publishing course textbooks online from 30 days before the course begins to 14 days before the first day of registration
- Change the way board meetings are noticed

Dr. Jim Henningsen asked Mr. Mullowney to work with the lobbyists and support councils on this.

Mr. Matthew Holliday reported there are 688 bills filed. The lobbyists are watching the firearms on campus bill. Dr. Ken Atwater asked if the Policy and Advocacy Committee had a position on this bill and suggested partnering with law enforcement on the position of this bill. Mr. Steve Schroeder reported the Chief of Police Association opposes the bill and the Florida Sheriff's Association has not taken a position at this time. Dr. Jim Henningsen stated the law enforcement agencies can be contacted. Dr. John Holdnak recommended the Policy and Advocacy Committee to craft a position to oppose the bill.

<u>Action:</u> Upon a motion by Dr. John Holdnak and a second by Mr. John Grosskopf, the Policy and Advocacy Committee to craft a position to oppose the firearms on campus bill was approved by without objection.

Dr. Jim Murdaugh suggested a friendly amendment to state the Policy and Advocacy Committee endorses the position taken by the professional law enforcement agencies.

<u>Action:</u> Upon a motion by Dr. Jim Murdaugh and a second by Dr. Ken Atwater, the friendly amendment to state the Policy and Advocacy Committee to endorse the position taken by the professional law enforcement agencies was approved by without objection.

There is a pair of fee exemption bills. One bill is regarding students that have been adopted from the Department of Children and Families and the other addresses veterans.

The Department of Children and Families bill will expand the exemptions and to increase the time frame to claim these exemptions until the student is 28 years old. The exemptions will allow the student to have unlimited attempts at remedial course work. Dr. Jonathan Gueverra asked how these students will be identified. Ms. Kasongo Butler stated clarification is still needed.

The veterans fee exemption bill states if in-state tuition rates are not given to the veteran or their qualified dependent, the college will be unenrolled from the GI Bill.

Dr. Chuck Mojock asked if the PECO voluntary contributions bill is being tracked by the

lobbyists. Mr. Holliday stated it is being watched.

Mr. Joe Pickens reported there is a friendly bill that adds two trustees to St. Johns River State College to ensure all counties in the college's service area are represented. There will be no change in the statute.

Dr. Jim Henningsen referred to the handouts entitled <u>Untitled</u> (Attachment A) and <u>% of Model Funded Including Total Rev-Updated with 2014-15 Appropriations (Attachment B.) He reported legislators are interested in how the colleges would want compression money distributed, if money is available. After a discussion, Dr. Henningsen recommended the distribution index be used.</u>

<u>Action:</u> Upon a motion by Dr. Ty Handy and a second by Dr. Ed Meadows, the distribution index to be used, if compression money is available, was approved with two objections.

Dr. Ann McGee asked for a run using the \$35 million request.

Dr. Ed Massey reminded the presidents to keep the line of communication open.

Dr. Jim Henningsen adjourned the Policy and Advocacy Committee meeting at approximately 9:26 a.m. without objection.

#### Welcome and Call to Order

Mr. Michael Brawer introduced Moore Communications Group.

Ms. Abby Whiddon reported Moore Communications Group has developed a legislative message for the Council of Presidents. They created collateral material for the Trustees to use as they visited legislators. Moore Communications Group also pitched an op-ed piece statewide, with six media outlets running the piece. Following the op-ed, media availability was sent out to education reporters statewide.

Moore Communications Group is currently working on a second op-ed piece regarding performance funding. Once the piece is approved, it will be sent to the presidents.

Daytona State College asked how reporters were chosen to be reached out to. Moore Communications Group stated the op-ed piece was sent out the Editorial Page Editor; however, collaboration with the colleges is welcome. Mr. Brawer stated the PIOs will be included moving forward. The first op-ed piece was a fast track piece.

Ms. Whiddon reported Moore Communications Group will provide each college with a postcard template and ask the colleges to solicit students to write about how an increased investment from the Florida Legislature will impact the college they are enrolled at. Each college will be asked to complete 200-300 hand written postcards. This information will be collected via the #myFLcollege tagboard. Moore Communications Group will provide the colleges with a poster to help solicit the postcards and encourage immediate use of #myFLcollege. Also, at the Rally in Tally on April 9, the keynote speaker will be the given postcards detailing how students can benefit from an increased investment. FSCJ asked if this could be included with another event at each college. Ms. Whiddon responded yes, the colleges are free to integrate it with another event. Polk State Colleges asked when the template postcard would be available. Ms. Nanette Schimpf stated the template will be available next week and sent to the colleges both as a PDF and in InDesign.

Social media cheat sheets will also be sent to the colleges every two weeks. Data to be included in the social media cheat sheet was requested.
