SUBJECT: Quality Course Review / Quality Course Awards Program

Recommendation to the Council of Presidents from the COP Distance Learning Committee to activate the FLVC course quality designators.

Over the last three years the distance learning directors of their respective Florida College (FCS) Colleges have been working collaborative with their peers in the state university system in the establishment of quality designators for online courses. These courses will be listed in the in the Florida Shines Catalogue (FLVC) and accessible to both State University System (SUS) and Florida College System (FCS) students.

These quality designators are based on the Quality Matters design principles which have become the de-facto standard for online course design, incorporating a common set of design principles to online courses in addition to providing a level of ADA compliance. The designators field in the online FLVC catalogue was created to allow each system to activate their systems designator independently. However, the original plan was to turn on both systems designators at the same time. There was and still is an understanding that courses would be added progressively as they received Florida Online Quality designations.

The academic affairs vice-presidents of the FCS colleges have invested significant time and effort in moving their faculty in adopting and preparing courses for designation. The tentative timeline proposed in late 2017 for both the SUS and FCS to have courses ready for upload was the following;

Anticipated Timeline

- Fall 2018 – new catalog fields for course review designations available to pilot institutions
- Spring 2019 – Faculty award designation information finalized and provided to FLVC
- Summer 2019 – catalog fields for course review designations available to all FCS and SUS institutions
- Fall 2019 – public display of course designations begins
- Spring 2020 –catalog fields for faculty award designations available to all FCS and SUS institutions

The issue today is due to a slower than planned adoption the SUS is planning to delay activation of their designator field for at least one year. Conversely the FCS Distance Learning committee members are in favor of turning on the FCS field as planned in Spring or Summer 2020.

It is the recommendation of the committee that we request that FLVC activate the FCS quality designator field in the FloridaShines catalogue ahead of our SUS colleagues. This move will help maintain the momentum towards continuous quality improvement already established by our colleges chief academic officers.

Council for Instructional Affairs, Council for Student Affairs, and Council for Workforce Education Report to the Council of Presidents

Brief Overview

The Council on Instructional Affairs (CIA), the Council of Student Affairs (CSA) and Council for Workforce Education (CWE) work collaboratively to provide a coordinated and unified voice to the shared issues related to academic learning and student life at Florida College System's colleges. Serving in an advisory capacity to the Council of Presidents, they collaborate to develop solutions to statewide problems, and facilitate communication and the exchange of information among council members, other appropriate councils, state agencies, organizations, and/or individuals. The CIA/CSA/CWE Councils commit to researching and sharing promising practices that are **Relevant** to today's students, inspired by **Innovation**, focused on **Success**, and **Equity** minded.

Working within the framework of the CIA and CSA, five workgroups were established in 2017-2018 around themes to provide a statewide forum for more focused attention to specific issues that broadly impact academic and student affairs. At its Fall 2019 meeting, there was consensus to further refine the focus of the workgroups and streamline them to align more directly with the Council of Presidents 2020 legislative budget request. This revision provides for more integrated dialog around overlapping issues with specific goal to make inform the discussions of and make recommendations to the Council of Presidents.

Workgroups were charged with identifying areas of common challenges or areas of interest and creating a space for critical thinking and problem solving. Through dialog and research, they engage in deeper thought around the issues, provide solid information and, where appropriate, recommendations to the Council of Presidents through the CIA, CSA and CWE.
