#### Lt. Governor addresses anniversary event

It was a night to honor the past and celebrate the future as the Division of Community Colleges sponsored "A Golden Evening: Celebrating 50 Years of Florida's Community College System." The event, held on Wednesday, June 6, 2007 in Tampa, was attended by notables, past and present and included a special appearance by the Lieutenant Governor, Jeff Kottkamp, an alumnus of Edison Community College.

FACC was well represented including four of its past presidents, Margaret Massey, Sharon Crowe, Burt Harris and Leo Diaz, and the Association's current

president, Dr. Jeff Allbritten. CEO Michael Comins shared Master of Ceremony duties with Dr. E. Ann McGee, President of Seminole Community College.

The night was capped by a tribute to Chancellor J. David Armstrong, Jr. who will be leaving his post to assume the Presidency of Broward County Community College soon. Eight tributes and thunderous applause concluded the event, spectacular from beginning to end.



# Florida introduces "Go Higher-Get Accepted" Campaign

Our state once again has broken new ground with its "Go Higher-Get Accepted" campaign announced by Florida Education Commissioner Jeanine Blomberg recently. The purpose of the Go Higher-Get Accepted campaign is to help seniors without post-secondary plans get accepted at their community college before they graduate from high school. The vast majority of jobs require education and training beyond high school, and research shows that college graduates not only make more money and have more lifestyle choices than those with a high school diploma, they also live longer and are less likely to be unemployed during their lifetime.

# Florida unveils "Ready to Work" Credential Program

In order to meet the growing need for well-trained and qualified workers, the Florida legislature has approved a new program known as the "Ready to Work" Credential" Program. The authors identify the bill's goals as "enhancing student workplace skills; providing for implementation; providing program components; authorizing rulemaking; providing an effective date."

The attempt to better equip people entering the workforce was initiated by former Governor Bush in 2006 with the support and leadership of Representative Pickens and other key legislators. It allocates a total of \$13,250,000 for implementation and another \$4,000,000 for business outreach activities.

The Ready to Work Certification Program consists of "a comprehensive identification of workplace skills for each occupation identified for inclusion in the program by the Department of Education (DOE)." It includes a pre-instructional assessment to determine a student's understanding of the skills needed for a particular occupation and a targeted instructional program for areas not fully mastered by the individual. A certificate and portfolio will be awarded to students once they have demonstrated full comprehension of the instruction.

This innovative program may be conducted in community colleges and a number of other educational facilities across the state. To qualify as an "assessment site," an application must be submitted to AWI. A per student assessment will be paid to qualifying outlets. # **Top Digital Community Colleges Announced for 2007**

The top 10 tech-savvy community colleges for 2007 have been named by the Center for Digital Education and the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC). A ranking was established based on the third national Digital Community Colleges Survey, which

examined how colleges are deploying technology to streamline operations and better serve students, faculty and staff.

"Once again, the community colleges are implementing innovative projects and programs..." Nearly 200 community colleges across the country participated in the survey. Colleges were grouped into three categories based on student enrollment: small (less than 3,000 students), mid-sized (between 3,000 and 7,500 students) and large (more than 7,500 students). Florida Community College in Jacksonville, Fla. took first place in the large college category. Indian River Community College in Fort Pierce, Fla.


and Laramie County Community College in Cheyenne, Wyo. tied for first place in the category of mid-sized colleges. Patrick Henry Community College in Martinsville, Va. and Tompkins Cortland Community College in Dryden, N.Y. tied for first place in the small college category. Top-ten ranked winners were announced in each category.

Community college officials responded to a set of 24 multiple-choice questions and five narrative questions regarding online services and technology provisions offered to students, faculty and communities. Colleges provided Web site addresses and background data for final verification and validation.

"Once again, the community colleges are implementing innovative projects and programs with technology that are setting new standards for post-secondary education," said Marina Leight, vice president for education of the Center for Digital Education. "This year's community college winners have made a resounding commitment to improved delivery of services to students as well as leading the way for rich learning environments designed to make a difference in a student's career."

This success was due in no small part to the many stakeholders in the Florida Community College System. In the end, the Florida Legislature adjourned, Sine Die, at 4:10 p.m. on May 4, bringing the 2007 Regular Session to a close. 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## FKCC President "Doc" Bill Seeker establishes Legacy Scholarship Fund for first-generation students

The natives are a little restless on the southernmost islands of the Florida Keys, and it's with good reason: this July in 2007 their college president of 28 years will retire, marking the end of the "Seeker Era" at Florida Keys Community College.

FKCC President, Dr. William A. Seeker, who came from the Lone Star State's small town of Brenham will leave behind a Texas-sized legacy with shining star accomplishments such as

"Now, I want to make sure that students like me in the Florida Keys will have a chance to attend college." building a new \$50 million campus, pioneering the small college funding initiative to keep alive rurally isolated colleges, and maintaining a fund balance twice the state required amount, all this amidst Florida's record-breaking hurricane seasons.

Through the years, Seeker celebrated numerous milestones and accomplishments, but it's his recent personal gift to the College that will, perhaps, stand as the most meaningful for its personal expression

of gratitude and direct impact on the future of disadvantaged students. This farm boy turned educator, will hang up his hat next year but not before ensuring a college education for students who, like him, are first-in-their-family to attend college.

Seeker has written the first check for \$125,000 to establish the First-Generation-In-College Scholarship Fund, in honor of his parents Sue and Albert Seeker. He plans to give the college's Florida Keys Educational Foundation another \$125,000 in 2007, and will continue giving beyond his retirement, until he reaches his goal of half-a-million dollars. The Foundation will then optimize Seeker's gift by applying for state matching funds at 100% for a total endowment value of \$1 million. "My mom had an eighth-grade education and my dad a third-grade education," said Seeker in recognition of his humble beginnings, and the fact that his parents never had higher education opportunities. "This is my way of showing my Mom and Dad that I'm thankful for their gift of helping me achieve a college education. Now, I want to make sure that students

like me in the Florida Keys will have a chance to attend college," said Seeker. He has also set up an endowment fund at Texas A & M in honor of his mother and father to benefit students there.

Raised on a small farm in Brenham, Texas by parents Sue and Albert, Seeker knew early on that education would be his ticket out of working long days in the hot sun, and so the rigors of academia seemed a welcome breeze.

Seeker's winding path to the college presidency was marked with leadership positions and distinguished careers. Upon graduation from Brenham High School, Seeker attended Texas A & M where he earned his Bachelor of Science degree. He then entered the U.S. Army as a second lieutenant and completed infantry and airborne training. Seeker achieved the rank of Captain with the Twenty-Second Battle Group of the Strategic Army Command. After honorable discharge from

active duty, he began working as a cancer research technician at M.D. Anderson Cancer Institute in Houston, Texas.

In 1964 he received a master's degree in Biology with a concentration in education from Sam Houston University and later accepted a faculty position at New Mexico Military Institute where he taught biology for three years. In 1969, he earned a doctorate degree in higher

administration from Texas A & M, and headed for Hillsborough Community College in Tampa, Florida where he stayed 10 years, while moving up the ranks from Assistant Dean to Associate Dean, Dean, Provost, Campus Director and ultimately to Vice President. "Doc", as Seeker is affectionately known, became FKCC's third president in 1979. Today, he ranks number three in seniority among Florida community college presidents, and has an impressive 38 years of total service within the community college system with 28 of those years at FKCC.

Seeker's modest beginnings have no doubt shaped his character, and admittedly built his resilience. His executive desk features a wooden placard with the words "No Whining" and he's often heard quoting the words of football coach Bear Bryant "When the going gets tough, the tough get going." He is known for his no-nonsense talk and can-do attitude. If ever a college needed that kind of resilient leadership, it has been FKCC, the smallest and southernmost college located in Florida's highest cost-of-living county, Monroe. Having survived dozens of tropical storms and hurricanes, threats of being closed down in the late 1980's when old campus buildings dilapidated and changing county demographics, Seeker earned the reputation of being "The last of the John Wayne's". His sheer determination and hard work have carried the College through the toughest of times. "I never forgot where I came from, and though my friends jokingly call me the 'Educated Redneck' I am extremely proud of my roots," says the self-made millionaire. "I wanted to do something to make sure that students like me have a chance to go to college."

# Three chapters conduct leadership visits to Tallahassee

As the legislature in Tallahassee entered the second half of its session, three community colleges sent leadership groups to visit the State Capitol. Seminole Community College (SCC), Pasco-Hernando Community College (PHCC) and the Florida Community College at Jacksonville (FCCJ) all sponsored very successful trips in late March 2007.

The FCCJ trip was designed to help participants learn more about the legislative process and how FACC members can have greater impact on key issues. After a briefing that included a review of talking points, the leadership group visited their legislators and staff members to discuss concerns about the Banner Centers' funding. They also addressed the proliferation of

for-profit higher education in Florida and the legislature's role in spending taxpayer's funds on these schools.

Fourteen leaders from Pasco-Hernando, consisting of faculty, staff and mid-management employees, spent a very intensive two days learning more about themselves, the legislative process, FACC and their college using the Myers Briggs personality analysis and hearing from legislators and key community college professionals. Much of their time was spent listening to presentations and watching the Florida Senate in action, but they also had time for a tour of the Capitol and were treated to a view of Tallahassee from the 22nd floor!

Chancellor David Armstrong, Division of Community Colleges and Workforce Education, kicked off the SCC agenda with an overview of issues and projections for this year's legislative session. The leadership group then journeyed to the Capitol where they participated in a very intensive schedule of morning meetings with senators, representatives, FACC officials and other industry leaders. The day concluded with a luncheon speech by Dr. T.K. Wetherell, President of Florida State University.

## Brevard CC Trustees praise James Drake as brilliant, passionate

In the president's office at Brevard Community College the shelves and counters are bare, waiting for the next leader to mark them with awards and collegial memorabilia. But the fifth president of BCC said his legacy won't be made behind the doors of the regal office. "The presidency is not an office job," said James Drake who accepted the position recently. "You pay a penalty staying (in the office.) This is a relationship-building role. It's very important not to be sequestered." So, the 5-foot-3-inch Drake said he won't be treading softly on the plush blue behind presidential doors, but will be pounding the pavement of all BCC campuses, meeting students, faculty and staff. In a recent meeting, BCC's board of trustees unanimously accepted Drake as the school's next president. The board celebrated their selection throughout the final search meeting, the completion of a process that began when Thomas Gamble stepped down because of a terminal illness in the fall. "He has a confidence cloaked in humility," trustee Rick McCotter told the board. "He strikes me as being so tactfully polite, almost like he's read the etiquette book 80 times." Drake, 63, is a kind man who greets staff and visitors with hugs and handshakes, who listens intently and keenly remembers conversations, friends have said. Trustee James Theriac also could sing nothing but praise of Drake. "He's the most self-effacing person I've ever seen," Theriac said to the board. "He's absolutely frighteningly brilliant and has a fierce passion for the underdog. "Within those impeccable manners is a passion for mankind that few people see and I'm astounded by it. He's the pied piper, but it's real." Drake effortlessly surpassed all competition in the search. He was chosen as a top contender from a pool of about 30 applicants that included five presidents from respected community colleges around the nation, senior-level staff from several Florida community colleges and universities as well as two other internal BCC applicants and a former state representative.

Carol Shanklin, public relations manager for the center shared with those present all the new center will offer to the seniors of Columbia County. The center hours will be 8 a.m-5 p.m. with Phase I which was due to be completed in May. It will have a general activity area, kitchen, library, darkroom, workshop, art classroom, exercise room and a small dementia daycare facility. Phase II will enlarge the dementia daycare area to 4,000 square feet and will include an outdoor garden area. And the final Phase III will add an 8,000 square foot physical fitness area with heated swimming pool for arthritic therapy and general exercise.
